Col. 2:2¹ comforted

To comfort people's hearts is to cherish people and lovingly warm them up, that they may be knit together unto the full assurance of understanding of the mystery of God.

Col. 2:2² love

The divine love that we have enjoyed and by which we love God's beloved. This love is the factor and element that knits the saints together.

Col. 2:2³ riches

The riches of the full assurance of understanding equal the full knowledge of the mystery of God, which is Christ.

Col. 2:2⁴ full

To be knit together in love involves the emotion, whereas to have the riches of the full assurance of understanding involves the mind. When our hearts have been comforted, we being knit together in love, and our minds function properly, we will have the full knowledge of Christ as the mystery of God.

Col. 2:2⁵ mystery

The book of Ephesians concerns the mystery of Christ, which is the church, the Body (Eph. 3:4). This book concerns the mystery of God, which is Christ, the Head.

Col. 2:3¹ wisdom

According to history, the influence of Gnostic teaching, which included Greek philosophy, invaded the Gentile churches in Paul's time. Hence, the apostle told the Colossians that all the treasures of genuine wisdom and knowledge are hidden in Christ. This is the spiritual wisdom and knowledge of the divine economy

concerning Christ and the church. Wisdom is related to our spirit, and knowledge is related to our mind (Eph. 1:8, 17).

Portions from the Life-study messages

In Colossians the heart is of crucial significance. Here Paul emphasizes the importance of the heart in receiving the revelation concerning Christ....The church in Colossae had been invaded by Jewish ordinances and observances and by pagan philosophy, mysticism, and asceticism. These things caused the saints to become opinionated, dissenting, and dissatisfied. They also caused the hearts of the saints to be hurt and to become cold, divided, and separated from one another. Therefore, Paul struggled on behalf of the saints that their hearts would be comforted and knit together in love....The comforting of the heart must have a result. In this case the result is having all the riches of the full assurance of understanding....The Colossians did not have the full assurance concerning Christ. Otherwise, they would not have turned to the worship of angels or taken in such things as observances, ordinances, and philosophies.

In 2:2 Paul speaks not only of the full assurance, but of all the riches of the full assurance of understanding....Some saints may have the full assurance concerning the church ground, but...when they speak about the ground of the church, they have little to say. The reason for this is lack of the riches the in their understanding....Regarding the ground of the church, we need to be exercised until we have all the riches of the full assurance of understanding.

The principle is the same with knowing Christ as the mystery of God. We need to be exercised to such an extent that we always have something to say about Christ as the mystery of God....If we have all the riches of the full assurance of understanding concerning [Christ], we shall never be short of things to say about Him. The riches of understanding will give us rich utterance. (*Life-study of Colossians*, *pp. 139, 149*)

Col. 2:5¹ spirit

The human spirit indwelt by the Holy Spirit.

Col. 2:5² in

Lit., into.

Col. 2:6¹ received

Christ is the allotted portion of the saints (1:12) for their enjoyment. To believe into Him is to receive Him. As the all-inclusive Spirit (2 Cor. 3:17), He enters into us and dwells in our spirit (2 Tim. 4:22) to be everything to us.

Col. 2:6² walk

As we have received Christ, we should walk in Him. Here to walk is to live, to act, to behave, and to have our being. We should walk, live, and act in Christ that we may enjoy His riches, just as the children of Israel lived in the good land, enjoying all its rich produce. The good land today is Christ as the all-inclusive Spirit (Gal. 3:14), who dwells in our spirit (2 Tim. 4:22; Rom. 8:16) to be our enjoyment. To walk according to this Spirit (Rom. 8:4; Gal. 5:16) is the central and crucial point in the New Testament.

Col. 2:7¹ rooted

Like plants, we are living organisms. As such, we have been rooted in Christ, our soil, our earth, that we may absorb all His riches as nourishment. These riches become the element and substance with which we grow and are built up. To be rooted is for the growth in life. This rooting has been completed already. To be built up is for the building of the Body of Christ. This is still going on. Both these matters are in Christ.

Col. 2:7² in

In the faith here means in our faith, the subjective faith by which we believe.

Portions from the Life-study messages

Paul realized the importance of being rooted in Christ. He knew that it was a serious matter to be transplanted from Christ and to be rooted in something else, such as heathen philosophy or Jewish ordinances. He wanted the Colossians to see that philosophy was not the soil in which they had been rooted. They had been rooted in Christ. He is our unique soil.

Having been rooted in Christ, we now are "being built up in Him" (2:7). To be built up is for the building of the Body. Although we have been rooted, we are still in the process of being built up. This is a corporate matter as well as a personal matter. A building is not composed merely of one item, but of many items that have been fitted together. We need to be rooted in Christ and also built up in the church.

Paul was concerned lest the Colossians be distracted from Christ and the church. They had been rooted in Christ, but they still had to go on to be built up in the church. In order to be built up corporately, the Colossians had to forsake the Judaistic observances and the heathen ordinances and philosophies. Otherwise, they would have been transplanted from Christ and rooted in something else. Furthermore, they would have been led astrav from the church life. Whenever we take in some kind of philosophy, ordinance, observance, or practice in place of Christ, the church life is annulled. We are divided from those believers who have different opinions concerning these matters. Those who are preoccupied with such things will eventually cease to care about the church life....How crucial it is to be rooted in Christ and to be built up in Christ and in the church! In this way we experience Christ as the mystery of God. (Life-study of Colossians, pp. 156-157)

Related Verses

Portions from the footnotes

Col. 2:4¹ delude

In order for believers to be deluded, or carried off as spoil, something close to the truth, such as philosophy, must be used to deceive them. If we have a clear vision of Christ as the center of God's economy, no one will be able to delude us (v. 8). If we take Christ as life (3:4), hold Him as the Head of the Body (v. 19), know Him as the mystery of God (v. 2), experience Him as the hope of glory (1:27), and walk in Him as the allinclusive Spirit (2:6), we will not be deceived by anything or anyone.

Col. 2:4² persuasive

We should beware of persuasive speech and of eloquence. A speaker may be very persuasive and very eloquent, but the reality of Christ may not be in his persuasive and eloquent speech.

Col. 2:8¹ philosophy

This refers to Gnostic teaching, a mixture of Jewish, oriental, and Greek philosophies, which is an empty deceit.

Col. 2:8² tradition

Tradition is related to culture and has its source in culture. The source of the Gnostic teaching at Colossae was the tradition of men; it was based not on the revealed writings of God but on the traditional practices of men.

Col. 2:8³ elements

The same expression, elements of the world, is used in Gal. 4:3 (see note there). Here it refers to the rudimentary teachings of both Jews and Gentiles, consisting of ritualistic observances regarding the eating of meats, drinking, washings, asceticism, and other matters.

Col. 2:8⁴ Christ

Christ is the governing principle of all genuine wisdom and knowledge, the reality of all genuine teaching, and the only measure of all concepts acceptable to God. This book focuses on Christ as our everything.

Portions from the Life-study messages

Paul opens 2:4 with the words, This I say." These words refer to what Paul has covered in verses 2 and 3 concerning the riches of the full assurance of understanding, the full knowledge of Christ as the mystery of God, and the fact that all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge are hidden in Christ. Paul emphasized these things so that the saints at Colossae would not be deluded....If we see the vision of the all-inclusive Christ presented in the book of Colossians, we shall not be deluded by anything. No matter how excellent or how scriptural a thing may be, it will not be able to lead us away from Christ. It is crucial that we have such a view of Christ in God's economy.

The first step, seen in verse 4, is to be deluded; the second step, seen in verse 8, is to be carried off as spoil. The word spoil here does not mean to damage; it means to be a prey or a captive. Those who are carried off as spoil are carried off into captivity.

We need to beware that no one carries us off as spoil through his philosophy....The philosophy through which the believers at Colossae were carried off as spoil was Gnosticism, a mixture of Jewish, oriental, and Greek philosophies. As Paul indicates, Gnosticism is empty deceit The philosophy and empty deceit in this verse is "according to the tradition of men, according to the elements of the world, and not according to Christ."...One principle we should follow is that of testing everything with the Bible. We should care only for God's direct revelation in the holy Word, not for anything that is according to the tradition of men....In the eyes of Paul, the traditions of men were merely elementary principles. These traditions are included with the elementary principles of the world.

Paul concludes verse 8 by saying that the philosophy and empty deceit are not according to Christ. Christ is the governing principle of all genuine wisdom and knowledge, the reality of all genuine teaching, and the only measure of all concepts acceptable to God. The book of Colossians focuses on Christ as our everything....If we experience Christ as the center of God's economy in all these aspects, we shall be protected, and we shall not be deluded or carried off as spoil. (*Life-study of Colossians, pp. 172-173, 174-176*)

Portions from the footnotes

Col. 2:9¹ fullness

Fullness refers not to the riches of God but to the expression of the riches of God. What dwells in Christ is not only the riches of the Godhead but the expression of the riches of what God is. See note 193 in Eph. 3.

Col. 2:9² Godhead

This refers to deity, which is different from the divine characteristics manifested by the created things (Rom. 1:20). This strongly indicates the deity of Christ. The fullness of the Godhead is versus the tradition of men and the elements of the world. The world's tradition and elements simply cannot be compared with the fullness of the Godhead.

Col. 2:9³ bodily

This points to the physical body that Christ put on in His humanity, indicating that all the fullness of the Godhead dwells in Christ as One who has a human body. Before Christ's incarnation, the fullness of the Godhead dwelt in Him as the eternal Word, but not bodily. From the time that Christ became incarnate, clothed with a human body, the fullness of the Godhead began to dwell in Him in a bodily way; and in His glorified body (Phil. 3:21) now and forever it dwells.

Col. 2:10¹ full

The Greek word implies completion, perfection. Because all the fullness dwells in Him, after we have been put into Christ (1 Cor. 1:30), we are made full, filled up, with all the divine riches. Hence, we need no other source. Because Christ is our perfection and completion, we do not need other rules and authorities as objects of adoration, for He is the Head of all these. This is versus angel worship (v. 18).

Col. 2:10² rule

The rule and authority here are the fallen angels occupying positions of power in the air in subordination to Satan. See note 152.

Col. 2:11¹ circumcision

This is spiritual circumcision, the circumcision of Christ, referring to the proper baptism, which puts off the body of the flesh by the effectual virtue of the death of Christ. This is contrary to asceticism (vv. 20-22).

Col. 2:11² not

The circumcision that is the putting off of the body of the flesh was not made with hands; it was accomplished by the death of Christ, and it is applied, executed, and carried out by the powerful Spirit.

Col. 2:11³ putting

Putting off here means to strip off something, as one would strip off clothes.

Col. 2:12¹ Buried

To be buried in baptism is to put off, to strip off, the body of the flesh.

Col. 2:12² raised

In baptism there is the aspect of burial, which is the termination of our flesh, and the aspect of raising, which is the germination of our spirit. In the aspect of raising, we are made alive in Christ with the divine life.

Col. 2:12³ faith

Faith is not of ourselves; it is the gift of God (2 Pet. 1:1). The more we turn to God and contact Him, the more faith we have. The Lord is the Author and Perfecter of our faith (Heb. 12:2). The more we abide in Him, the more we are infused with Him as our faith. It is through this living faith produced by the operation of the living God that we experience the resurrection life, signified by the raising aspect of baptism.

Col. 2:13¹ dead

Dead in spirit because of sin.

Col. 2:13² made

In Christ's resurrection, God enlivened us together by His divine life. This was accomplished in Christ's resurrection (1 Pet. 1:3) and is experienced through our faith.

Col. 2:14¹ Wiping

Or, blotting out, obliterating, erasing, annulling (a decree of law).

Col. 2:14² handwriting

A legal document, a bond. Here it refers to the written law.

Col. 2:14³ ordinances

Referring to the ordinances of the ceremonial law with its rituals, which are the forms or ways of living and worship. So also in vv. 20 and 21.

Col. 2:14⁴ nailing

This is to abolish the law of the commandments in ordinances (Eph. 2:15). It kills the heresy of keeping the Judaic rituals.

Col. 2:15¹ Stripping

Or, putting off, as in 3:9. Verses 13-15 unveil the economy of God's salvation: (1) to make us alive with Christ, (2) to abolish the ordinances of the ceremonial law, and (3) to strip off the evil angelic powers.

God was busy while Christ's crucifixion was going on: He nailed the law on the cross and stripped off the rulers and authorities, that the way and the atmosphere might be cleared for us to enter into the participation in Christ.

Col. 2:15² rulers

These are the angelic rulers and authorities. Because at Colossae there was the heretical teaching of angel worship, the passage here must refer to the evil angels. The law was ordained through angels and was even considered to be ordinances of angels (Gal. 3:19; Acts 7:53). Based on this, the heresy at Colossae taught people to worship angels (v. 18) as mediators between God and man. The apostle dealt with this heresy by unveiling the fact that the law, consisting of ordinances, had been nailed to the cross (v. 14), and that the leading evil angels had been stripped off from God. This left Christ as the sole Mediator, who is the Head of all rule and authority (v. 10). This killed the heresy of angel worship.

Col. 2:15³ He

Here and throughout vv. 13 and 14, He refers to God (v. 12).

Col. 2:15⁴ display

Or, show, exhibit in the sense of an open shame. God openly shamed the evil angelic rulers and authorities on the cross and triumphed over them in it.

Col. 2:15⁵ it

Or, in Him; referring to Christ. It refers to the cross.

Portions from the Life-study messages

Paul's concept in these verses is that the law and the angels have been set aside through the cross. The law was nailed to the cross, and the evil angels have been stripped off by means of the cross. Therefore, in God's economy in His salvation there is room neither for the law nor for the angelic rulers. How wrong the Colossians were in following ordinances and in worshipping angels!...The Colossians were altogether wrong in allowing these things to pervade the church.

In the economy of His salvation God enlivens us, nails the law to the cross, and strips off the evil rulers and authorities. The law is a frustration, and the rulers and authorities are troublesome. Because God has removed the law and the angels, we, His chosen people, are alone with Him. We are no longer bothered by terms, conditions, or requirements. God is here to enliven us, and we are here to be enlivened by Him. We should forget the law and the angels and allow God to put Himself into us as life. (*Life-study of Colossians, pp. 192-193*)

Col. 2:16¹ in

Or, in food and in drink. Food and drink signify satisfaction and strengthening.

Col. 2:16² feast

Referring to the annual Jewish festivals, which signify joy and enjoyment.

Col. 2:16³ new

Signifying a new beginning with light in the darkness.

Col. 2:16⁴ Sabbath

Signifying completion and rest. Feasts are yearly, new moons monthly, Sabbaths weekly, and eating and drinking daily. Daily we eat and drink Christ, weekly we have completion and rest in Him, monthly we experience a new beginning in Him, and throughout the year He is our joy and enjoyment. Therefore, daily, weekly, monthly, and yearly Christ is to us the reality of every positive thing, implying the universal extensiveness of the all-inclusive Christ.

Col. 2:17¹ shadow

All the aforementioned items of the ceremonial law are a shadow of the spiritual things in Christ, which are the things to come. But the body belongs to Christ and is Christ.

Col. 2:17² body

As with a man's physical body, the body here is the substance. And like the shadow of a man's body, the rituals in the law are a shadow of the real things in the gospel.

Col. 2:17³ Christ

Christ is the reality of the gospel. All the good things in the gospel belong to Him and are Him. This book unveils such an all-inclusive Christ as the focus of God's economy.

Portions from the Life-study messages

Many things in our environment of daily living are also shadows of Christ. For example, the food we eat is a shadow, not the real food. The real food is Christ. Christ is also the real drink. The clothing we wear to cover us, to beautify us, and to keep us warm is also a shadow of Christ. Christ is the One who truly covers our nakedness, who keeps us warm, and who imparts beauty to us. Christ is also our true dwelling place and real rest. The houses in which we live are a shadow of Christ as our dwelling place. The rest we enjoy at night is also a figure of Christ as our rest. Even the satisfaction we enjoy after a good meal is not the real satisfaction, but a shadow of Christ as the reality of satisfaction.... He is the real food, drink, completion, rest, new moon, and feast.

In chapter one Paul shows us that Christ is the portion of the saints, the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, the Head of the Body, the firstborn from among the dead, the One in whom all the fullness is pleased to dwell, and our indwelling hope of glory. In chapter two he goes on to say that Christ is the mystery of God and the One in whom all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge are hidden. After all this, Paul comes to our practical living, which involves daily, weekly, monthly, and yearly matters....The reality of all these daily, weekly, monthly, and yearly things is Christ.

In verse 17 Paul says that Christ is the body of all the shadows. This means that He is the reality of our food and drink, of our completion and rest, of our new beginning with light in darkness, and of our enjoyment and joy. Every day, week, month, and year we need Christ. All the positive things in our daily life, weekly life, monthly life, and yearly life must be Christ. Christ must become everything to us not merely in a doctrinal way, but in the way of experience. I can testify that Christ is my completion, my rest, my new beginning, my enjoyment, my joy, my food, my drink, and my satisfaction. Although Christ is universally vast, He is also all the detailed aspects of our practical daily living. Day by day, He is our breath and everything to us. (*Life-study of Colossians, pp. 198-200*)

Crucial points

Colossians 1:9-3:11 unveils Christ as the preeminent and all-inclusive One, the centrality and universality of God. Chapter two reveals that Christ is the mystery of God (vv. 1-7) and the body of all the shadows (vv. 8-23).

In verses 1 through 3 Paul emphasizes the importance of the heart in receiving the revelation concerning Christ. He struggled on behalf of the saints that their hearts would be comforted and knit together in love. This comforting of the heart results in our having all the riches of the full assurance of understanding. The Colossians did not have the full assurance concerning Christ. Otherwise, they would not have turned to the worship of angels or taken in such things as observances, ordinances, and philosophies. They lacked the full knowledge of the mystery of God, Christ, in whom are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge—the spiritual wisdom and knowledge of the divine economy concerning Christ and the church.

In verses 4 through 7 we see that we have received Christ as the all-inclusive Spirit and that we must walk in Him as our good land. Further, we have been rooted in Christ that we may absorb all His riches as nourishment. These riches become the element and substance with which we grow and are built up as the Body of Christ.

We must beware that no one carries us off as spoil through his philosophy and empty deceit, according to the tradition of men, according to the elements of the world, and not according to Christ (v. 8). Christ is the governing principle of all genuine wisdom and knowledge, the reality of all genuine teaching, and the only measure of all concepts acceptable to God. The book of Colossians focuses on Christ as our everything. If we experience Christ as the center of God's economy, we shall be protected, and we shall not be deluded or carried off as spoil.

Because all the fullness of the Godhead is in Christ (v. 9) and because we have been placed in Him (1 Cor. 1:30), we have been made full in Him (v. 10) and are short of nothing. Furthermore, we have also been circumcised in Him (v. 11) from every negative thing. In baptism there is the aspect of burial (v. 12), which is the termination of our flesh, and the aspect of raising, which is the germination of our spirit. In the aspect of raising, we are made alive in Christ with the divine life.

Paul's concept in verses 13 through 15 is that the law and the angels have been set aside through the cross. The law was nailed to the cross, and the evil angels have been stripped off by means of the cross. Therefore, in God's economy in His salvation there is room neither for the law nor for the angelic rulers. Because God has removed the law and the angels, we, His chosen people, are alone with Him. We are no longer bothered by terms, conditions, or requirements. God is here to enliven us, and we are here to be enlivened by Him. We should forget the law and the angels and allow God to put Himself into us as life.

In verse 16 Paul comes to our practical living, which involves daily (eating and drinking), weekly (Sabbaths), monthly (new moons), and yearly (feasts) matters. Verse 17 says that Christ is the body of all these shadows. Christ must be everything to us not merely in a doctrinal way, but in a way of experience. Every positive thing in our daily life, weekly life, monthly life, and yearly life must be Christ. Although Christ is universally vast, He is also all the detailed aspects of our practical living.
